How to Provide Your Desired Salary (With Tips and Examples ...

If you decide to share a range for desired salary in the interview, always make it a broad range, like \$40,000-60,000. And state your desired range boldly. Don't be tentative, or offer the range in the form of a question. Then, immediately shift the conversation back to the skills and value you will bring to the role.

For example, if you're personally looking for \$85,000 to \$100,000 and your best guess of what the company has budgeted is \$80,000 to \$95,000, you could give a range of \$92,000 to \$100,000, so that even if the company negotiates below the range you stated in your interview, you're still happy.

Your desired compensation takes into account the total value of any financial benefits; this includes your base salary and non-cash compensation, such as benefits, vacation, stock-options, health insurance, stipend, 401k, etc. Typically, the value of non-cash compensation will range from 40-60% of the value of the cash compensation, but it can be significantly higher in some cases.

Putting a range comes in a distant second. Let's say you currently make \$50,000 and are hoping for a decent increase, so you enter a range of \$55,000 – \$65,000. The problem here is that you broke one of the golden rules by providing a number first.

Boxed In: How to Bypass the "Desired Salary" Field on ...

If the employer is starting at a much lower range than your desired compensation, then say so and ask whether the figures would be adjusted for the right hire. Don't waste your time or the employer's if it's clear from the start that you won't reach an agreement on salary.

As a general rule, start about 10 to 15 percent above your desired number to give yourself some room. A question about salary should never take you by surprise. Once you get called for an interview, you should begin considering your minimum requirements for working at the company that called you.

But if you are not sure what to put as desired salary range, for instance, you can write \$45,000-\$60,000 or \$65,000-\$75,000. Offer a range. Even if you start by emphasizing your flexibility, most employers will still want to hear specific numbers. In this case, offer them a range (plus or minus about \$10,000-\$20,000). This will allow you to remain flexible while still giving the employer a clear answer.

What Not to Say About Desired Salary Questions. Sometimes, the best answer is in what you don't say. Avoid these reactions when asked about your expectations, your current salary, or history during a salary negotiation or discussion: A specific salary. If you must give a specific number, share a range.

How to Answer, 'What's Your Expected Salary?'

Answer the Desired Salary question. We answer this question with a single number, not a range. We don't hesitate, and we don't stall. If we give a range, the recruiter will ONLY hear the low number in the range. Explain your position along the following lines: This is a great opportunity. I know I will learn a lot here and feel like I can ...

For example, if you want to make \$45,000, don't say you're looking for a salary between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Instead, give a range of \$45,000 to \$50,000. Be confident: Some employers are interested in your answer as well as your delivery.
